Posting a Query

As a family historian, you will ask for information from other researchers who may be tracing the same family lines. Queries may be published in magazines, genealogical society publications, or online mail lists or forums. Writing a concise short paragraph that clearly defines your question will help readers understand what you want. Follow the hints and use the Query Abbreviations to write an effective query.

Writing a Query

Not sure how to write a good query? View an example and read some helpful hints for Writing a Query below. Good queries are: Clear—Specific—Simple—Concise

How to Start

Each query should ask a specific question or questions about one particular individual. Clearly state your question right at the start. For example: "Seek bpl/d/m of Allen Smith..." Sometimes you might want to ask a question about a number of people; for example, a husband and wife. If this can be done simply, without causing confusion, it is acceptable. However, if there is no obvious connection between these individuals or if the query becomes too complicated, then submit a separate query for each individual.

Subject Lines

Subject lines in email queries and on message boards should be short and to the point. Surnames, place names, and dates are all that is necessary. Do not include unnecessary text. More complete details can be provided in the body of the message.

Sentence Beginnings

Avoid beginning sentences with pronouns; this can cause confusion especially when a number of individuals have been mentioned and it is unclear which one you're referencing. By using actual names to begin sentences, you can avoid ambiguities.

Abbreviations

If you want to use accepted abbreviations for your query, consult the list of Query Abbreviations below.

What Not to Include

Any information that is not *directly* related to your query

should not be included. It is often tempting to include some of the interesting facts you have discovered about your subjects and to explain your relationship to them, but remember—your goal is to write a query that can be read quickly and easily, and to get a result. You can best achieve this by keeping it clear, specific, simple, and concise.

Use these standard Query Abbreviations to save space and help ensure a concise, readable query.

These standard abbreviations are used in creating effective genealogical queries.

Julie Tarr (Genealogy in Action) has written several articles on writing Queries. When I went looking for information I found she had some really great ideas and would be someone to check out if you have the time.

Some points I learned from her article are as follows.

Include enough information in the title to attract people to look at your message; if you are too vague they will dismiss it.

Provide clear written information of what you are looking for and what you already know, could be information, and as much of the family information as you can; just don't go overboard.

Give a clear objective of what you are trying to learn; don't ask for everything including the kitchen sink. (you don't want to take advantage of them)

Include places and documents that you have searched; but summarize it.

When mailing a query be sure to send a SASE (self addressed stamped envelope).

Don't just slap something together or use slang, text jargon, or abbreviations that no one but you understands. Write using proper grammar, spellings, punctuation, make your English teachers proud.

Don't link your tree to the query

Respond to questions, promptly, don't wait days (these people are trying to help you respond).

Be specific, provide enough information, be polite, and be sure to thank them whether they find anything or not.

And most of all be sure to pay it forward. Someday someone might ask you for help and you will be the person giving aid to another struggling genealogist.

How Are the Names Organized?

When using a record series, do you think about how the originals were recorded and organized? It's usually worth a thought:

- Vital records are usually recorded by file date, not necessarily the date of the event.
- Land records are organized by date the document was brought for recording, not the date the document was executed.
- Baptism records are organized by date of baptism, not birth date.
- Census records are organized geographically with the amount of precision varying over time and from one place to another. Names may be organized in order of visit or roughly alphabetized.
- Loose probate papers are organized by probate case and those case files are generally organized by a case number—which may have been assigned based upon when the probate process was begun.
- And there are always exceptions and locations that seemingly invent their own system. Be flexible.
